# Verdigris Valley Electric Cooperative Board of Trustees Welcomes ATTORNEY GENERAL GENTNER DRUMMOND

n a crisp morning at VVEC's headquarters, the cooperative welcomed a familiar face from Osage County: Attorney General Gentner Drummond. A lifelong VVEC member, Drummond lives on his family's generational ranch near Hominy.

With sincerity and gratitude, he began his remarks by thanking the board and members for the chance to speak, adding that what makes VVEC unique is its purpose. Unlike investor-owned utilities, VVEC stands apart because everything is done for the membership—not for shareholders, a reminder of the cooperative principle that guides every decision.

Drummond traced his own path of public service back to a conversation with his grandfather when he was just 14 years old. That exchange, he explained, planted the seeds that ultimately grew into his calling to serve. After graduating, he went on to serve in the military before returning home to Oklahoma, where he raised his family and continued building the foundation that would eventually lead him to the office of Attorney General.

Looking ahead, Drummond shared four principles he believes are critical as he pursues the governor's office: building and honoring tribal relations and compacts, addressing the growing problem of illegal marijuana grow-house operations, strengthening transparency through open meetings and public records across all levels of government, and protecting the separation of religion and state—even in the context of education.

Drummond concluded with words of resolve. He reiterated his support for law enforcement, expressed his gratitude for the honor of serving as Attorney General, and announced to the VVEC membership that he is officially a candidate for governor.

he kitchen can be one of the busiest places in the house during the holidays. From prepping Thanksgiving sides to baking Christmas cookies (and, of course, sneaking a few samples along the way), it's where memories are made. But whether you're a seasoned cook or just trying your hand at holiday baking, it's also important to keep electrical safety in mind.

A few common hazards can cause electric shock in the kitchen, such as worn cords, faulty wiring, or using damp cloths or water near appliances. To help keep your holiday cooking safe, always follow the directions that come with your appliances and dry your hands before handling plugs or cords.



If a cord gets wet, don't plug it in until it's completely dry, and never handle appliances while standing in water. When unplugging something, gently pull on the plug itself—not the cord.

Take a quick look around your kitchen before the cooking starts. Make sure cords aren't stretched under rugs, across walkways, or draped where someone could trip. Inspect cords and plugs for any cracks, frays, or exposed wires, and toss anything that looks questionable. Only handle the insulated part of a cord, and never remove the third prong from a plug—that's an important safety feature.

Extension cords, power strips, and surge protectors should only be used as temporary helpers, not permanent fixes. Be sure they're in good condition and the right size for the job (a lower gauge number means they can handle more power). And if you ever wonder about your home's electrical system, don't hesitate to call a licensed electrician to check things out.

Most importantly, make sure everyone in your household knows how to safely turn off your home's power in an emergency. A little preparation goes a long way in keeping your kitchen a safe, happy place to cook, share, and celebrate throughout Thanksgiving, Christmas, and the holiday season.

# Brownie Bottom Pumpkin Cheesecake



#### **DIRECTIONS**

#### STEP 1

Preheat oven to 350° and grease a 9" springform pan with baking spray. Make brownies: In a medium bowl, whisk the flour, cocoa powder, baking powder, and salt until combined.

#### STEP 2

In a large microwave safe bowl, combine the butter and chocolate chips, microwave until just melted, about 1 ½ minutes. Whisk until smooth. Whisk in the granulated and brown sugar. Add the eggs, one at a time, whisking to fully combine before adding the next. Whisk in the vanilla. Fold in the dry ingredients.

#### STEP 3

Pour batter into the prepared pan and bake until brownie is set and a toothpick comes out clean, about 45 minutes. While brownie is still warm, use a spoon to press the brownie down and compact into an even crust that comes halfway up the pan. Let cool completely on a wire rack.

#### STEP 4

While the crust cools, make the cheesecake filling: Preheat oven to 325°. In a large bowl using a hand mixer, beat cream cheese and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, mixing well between each addition. Beat in pumpkin puree, sour cream, flour, vanilla, pumpkin pie spice, and salt until evenly combined.

#### STEP 5

Wrap bottom of pan in aluminum foil, then pour cheesecake mixture over brownie crust and place in a deep roasting pan.

#### **INGREDIENTS**

#### **FOR THE BROWNIE**

Baker's Joy Baking Spray 3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1/4 cup dark cocoa powder

1/2 tsp. Kosher salt

1/4 tsp. Clabber Girl Baking Powder

1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, cut into 1/2" pieces

13/4 cups semisweet chocolate chips

3/4 cup granulated sugar

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

3 large eggs, room temperature

1 tsp. Spice Islands Pure Vanilla Extract

#### FOR THE CHEESECAKE

2 (8-oz.) blocks cream cheese, softened

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

2 large eggs, room temperature

2/3 cup pure pumpkin puree

2 Tbsp. sour cream, room temperature

1 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

1 tsp. Spice Islands Pure Vanilla Extract

1 tsp. Spice Islands Pumpkin Pie Spice, plus more for garnish

1/4 tsp. Kosher salt

Thick caramel sauce and whipped cream, for garnish

#### STEP 6

Transfer to the oven, then pour in enough boiling water to come up halfway in the pan. Bake until the center of the cheesecake only slightly jiggles, about 55 minutes. Turn off heat, prop open oven door, and let cheesecake cool in oven, 1 hour, then remove aluminum foil and refrigerate cheesecake in pan until firm, at least 5 hours and up to overnight.

#### STEP 7

Drizzle with caramel, dollop outer rim with whipped cream.

Sprinkle whipped cream with more pumpkin pie spice.
