High Cost of Fuels, Need for Power Plants Reasons for PCA Increase

he increase you are experiencing on the power cost adjustment (PCA) portion of your electric bill is due to an increase at the electric generation and transmission level. The major reasons are the high cost of generating fuels and the need for new power plants.

"Over the past decade, the cost for fuels used to generate electricity by our service provider Associated Electric Cooperative, Inc. (AECI) has gone up by 94 percent," explains VVEC General Manager Alice Houston. "AECI currently serves more than 850,000 electric consumers through 51 electric co-ops in Oklahoma, Missouri, and Iowa. Electric co-ops are expected to experience a 2-percent growth rate for the next 10 years, which is about the same as adding 30,000 homes. AECI anticipates a 45-percent growth in the number of members served by 2025, and new power plants must be built to meet that demand."

She goes on to explain the estimated cost for one AECI coal-fired plant is about \$1.7 billion, and federal environmental regulators require AECI to modify existing plants at a cost of about \$330 million.

"We learned in March that AECI is delaying indefinitely its plans to build a 660-megaWatt coal plant near Norborne, Mo., due to increasing costs and other uncertainties," she says. "AECI was pursuing the Norborne coal-based project to meet growing loads of the electric cooperatives it serves. AECI personnel are telling us now the Norborne project costs have significantly increased in less than three years and are now estimated at \$2 billion."

She goes on to say the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Utilities Service (RUS), a

traditional funding source for rural electric cooperatives, is currently unable to finance baseload generation for cooperatives. Although AECI's AA credit rating is one of the strongest ratings among all electric utilities nationally, seeking private lending would further increase project costs.

"There also is increasing uncertainty in the regulatory environment," she says, "and Congress continues to debate the environmental and economic impact of reducing greenhouse gas emissions, making the cost of reducing carbon dioxide from power plants unknown."

Houston goes on to say because of the way these issues impact the cost of generating and transmitting electricity, there is little that can be done at the distribution co-op level to offset that

"The majority of our annual budget is spent on purchased power; something we have little control over. We can control only about 22-percent of our annual budget, and we have been taking steps within our operations to cut back on expenditures where we could, or at least to keep them from increasing."

The pie chart on page 5 details how the coop's budget is spent:

- 60 percent for purchased power,
- 13 percent for maintenance-operations
- 8 percent for depreciation,
- 6 percent for interest,
- 5 percent for customer service,
- 4 percent for administration.
- 2 percent for taxes, and
- 2 percent for operating margins.
- "The only portions of the budget we can

If you should get a recording, please don't hang up; leave your information. It will be retrieved and given to the correct department. Every message is answered.

Members, Co-op Lose a Good Friend

VVEC members and employees lost a good friend February 14 when trustee Ken Easterling passed away after battling lung cancer.

Born May 25, 1930, Ken was reared in Tiawah and attended school there. Following graduation, he attended Northeastern Oklahoma A&M where he studied to become an electrician.

Ken's career was in electrical sales for Star Electric and Nelson Electric.

In 1953 he married Barbara Sellers and in 1954 they became members of VVEC. In 1993, members in district 5 elected him to represent them on VVEC's board of trustees.

His fellow trustees have elected him to serve as president, vice-president, and secretary-treasurer.

He was also elected by the trustees to represent VVEC on the board of directors for the Oklahoma Association of Electric Cooperatives.

Ken completed the Certified Cooperative Director Program sponsored by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and has also received Board Leadership certification.

"He put the membership first in any of our deliberations, and strongly supported not only VVEC, but the electric cooperative program in Oklahoma and throughout the nation. He became a good friend and was a pleasure to work with."

"Ken is going to be missed," says VVEC General Manager Alice Houston. "He took his responsibilities as a trustee seriously. Ken worked hard to represent his fellow members well at both the local and state level. He was active on the board, and attended every board meeting from the time he was elected, until his illness advanced and prevented him from attending his last two meetings. We all enjoyed working with Ken."

He is survived by his wife Barbara, of the home; son and daughter-in-law Ron and Jeanine Easterling of Claremore; daughter and son-in-law Sherrill and Kenny Blan of Verdigris; brother Bill Easterling of Claremore; seven grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren.

A background check, conducted by the Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation is required. The member information form for this investigation can be picked up at our Collinsville office, and must be completed and returned to the co-op by Tuesday, April 15.

Interested in Becoming a VVEC Trustee?

Here are the qualifications, as stipulated in the co-op bylaws

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a trustee of the cooperative who:

- (a) is not a member and bona fide resident in the area served or to be served by the cooperative; or
- (b) is any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to the members of the cooperative; or
 - (c) has been convicted, pled guilty, or pled nolo contendere to a felony; or
- (d) is a close relative of an incumbent trustee or of an employee of the cooperative, or
- (e) is or was an employee of the cooperative during the preceding three years prior to time of filing or being nominated.

Look Up for Your Home's Energy Efficiency

Roofs are perhaps the important component of an energy-efficient building. Unfortunately, compared to items like doors, windows, and lighting, roofs are generally much less durable and much less energy efficient.

Over the lifetime of a building, a roof needs to be replaced an average of four times. More than 75 percent of the roofing work in the United States involves reroofing, and roofing materials are the second-largest contributor to solid waste in the United States.

Energy-efficient roof technologies are fairly straightforward. Manufacturers have developed lighter-colored shingles and tiles, usually containing a coating of titanium dioxide, since they absorb less heat than a typical asphalt shingle and can last twice as long. Since lighter surfaces are easily discolored by fungus, a fungicide coating normally gets added. Many of the new roof coatings are even self-cleaning to retain reflectivity properties and reduce



air conditioning requirements.

Lighter-colored roofs are slightly more expensive. However, the small cost difference—\$25 for a 1,000-square-foot roof—will easily pay for itself in one summer.

Roof overhangs are another way to trim summer cooling bills. For many homes and businesses in warmer cli-

Get Off the Fluctuating Bill Roller Coaster

If your electric bill fluctuates from month to month, you may want to try our Average Monthly Payment (AMP) Plan.

This plan levels out your electric bill so the amount due is close to the same amount each month.

Your average monthly payment is calculated by taking your current month's usage plus the 11 preceding months' usage and dividing that amount by 12. This total is then figured in the applicable rate category along with any taxes.

The average is calculated every month in the same manner.

The plan is available to all residential VVEC members who meet the following criteria:

- Have been a member of VVEC for at least 12 months;
- Have not been late in paying the electric bill more than twice during the previous 12 months;
 - The electric bill is currently paid in full.

To participate in the average monthly payment plan, call our billing department at (918) 371-2584, Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

actually control are maintenance-operations, customer service, and administrative costs," she explains.


"It is very similar to what we are experiencing with gasoline prices. As individuals, we can't do much about the price of a gallon of gas. But we can control how efficiently we use the gas we buy," she says.

"It was not our decision to increase the PCA, but we have tried to keep the membership informed of the increase and to explain the reasons for it, and to provide them with information to help them use electricity more efficiently," she says.

"We have several programs I encourage members to take advantage of to help control their electric usage.

"We can perform energy audits that help members improve the energy ef-

"No matter what the future brings regarding increases in power production, our commitment to providing dependable electric service doesn't waver. We will continue to provide reliable service at the lowest price possible."

Work Continues on FEMA Requirements Following December Ice Storm

Mother Nature has turned her attention to hurling thunderstorms at us and has all but forgotten about the devastating ice storm she threw at us last December. But we haven't forgotten.

We are working to meet FEMA requirements which will enable the co-op to be re-imbursed for a large percentage of the expenses associated with the storm's repair efforts.

According to VVEC Director of Operations Mike Hall, VVEC personnel have worked with FEMA field representatives to inspect the damage and document it on a county by county basis.

"The FEMA project worksheets have been closed out and have been submitted to the Oklahoma Emergency Management Agency (OEMA) as required," says Hall. "And we're working to complete the repairs we are aware need to be made, in 60 to 90 days."

He adds there will be two more onsite visits from FEMA before VVEC can expect to be re-imbursed.

He says traditionally the re-imbursements from FEMA and OEMA total about 87-percent of the co-op's storm damage and repair expenses.

The device is equipped with all seven NOAA channels, plus you can program your specific geographic area for maximum reception of local weather reports and severe weather bulletins.

The HomeSafe 2000 HS is \$94.71, plus tax. It comes programmed to your counties (up to six), and includes a one year warranty, AC and DC power cord adapters, and a connector for an external antenna.

The Sycom Surge Suppression System protects your home's appliances and sensitive electronic equipment with state-of-the-art equipment at a very economical price.

The two-part protection begins at the meter with a unit designed to prevent high-voltage spikes from entering your home. It's installed by VVEC personnel and redirects spikes and surges to your grounding system.

The second part of the protection involves special plug-in protectors for each specific piece of electronic equipment you choose to protect in your home.

The meter-base unit is \$117.60; and in-house devices range from \$35.60 to \$60.40, before tax. There is no charge for installing a meter unit on

new services, but there is a \$25 charge for installation on existing services.

How to Stay Safe During an Outage

Never touch a downed wire regardless of how harmless it may look! Stay away from it and keep others away, too. Report it immediately to VVEC, or call the local police or fire department. They may guard the downed line until we can get to that location and repair it.

Be very careful when trying to remove and clear trees and limbs. There could be 'live' electric lines lying among the debris.

Don't operate lanterns, heaters or fuel-fired cook stoves without adequate ventilation.

Do not burn charcoal indoors because it releases carbon monoxide.

Always refuel outside away from flames or sparks.

Don't store fuel inside your home. Wipe up fuel spills immediately. Don't allow children to carry candles or oil lamps around the house. A fall could spell disaster!

What to do if the Lights go Out

Call VVEC and report the outage. Be sure to have your account number or map location number ready, which can be found on your billing statement. Once we receive your report, your location is logged into our computer system for repairs.

Please be patient if the lines are busy. During major outages, our telephone lines are overloaded with members calling to report their situation.

Remember, calls are answered 24 hours a day, and in the order they are received.

From A Friend's Kitchen

Delicious Fools for April

Strawberry Fruit Fool

- 1 cup strawberry purée
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 Tbsp. granulated white sugar

Strawberry Purée:

1 lb. bag frozen unsweetened strawberries 1/3 cup plus 2 Tbsp. granulated white sugar

For the purée: Thaw the strawberries (this will take a few hours). Place them in a food processor, fitted with a steel blade, and process until the berries are puréed. Transfer to a bowl and stir in the sugar. Taste and add more sugar, if necessary. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight.

For Strawberry Fruit Fool: Place mixing bowl and whisk attachment in the refrigerator or freezer for about 15 minutes or until very cold. Whip the cream until soft peaks form. Add the sugar and continue to whip until stiff peaks form. With a rubber spatula gently fold in the strawberry purée, leaving some streaks of the white whipping cream. Pour the fool into four individual long-stemmed parfait or wine glasses. Cover and refrigerate until serving time. Can be made about 4 hours before serving. Garnish with a fresh strawberry.

Blackberry Fruit Fool

- 1 cup blackberry purée (recipe follows)
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 1/2 Tbsp. granulated white sugar

Blackberry Purée:

1 lb. bag frozen unsweetened blackberries 3/4 cup granulated white sugar

For the purée: In a strainer placed over a large bowl thaw the blackberries (this will take a few hours). Once the berries are thawed, press to remove all the juices so you are left with only the seeds in the strainer. You will have about 1 1/2 cups of puréed blackberries. Stir in the sugar, then taste, adding more sugar if necessary. Refrigerate for several hours or overnight. (There will be 1/2 cup of extra purée left over after making the fruit fools. This can be frozen for another use.)

For Blackberry Fruit Fool: Follow the Strawberry Fool directions.

When I was browsing through cookbooks looking for a recipe to share with you this month, I found some recipes for fools.

Now, we probably all know a fool or two, or may even have one in the family, but this isn't the same thing.

Fools are classic British desserts that consist of cooked or raw fruit that is puréed or mashed, then sweetened, chilled, and finally folded into stiffly beaten whipped cream (there should be streaks of the white cream showing where the fruit was not completely folded into the whipped cream.)

The recipes say the fools are best showcased when served in long stemmed parfait or wine glasses, and garnished with fresh fruit.

These would be wonderful for Sunday dinner dessert, a celebration brunch, or just a new way to enjoy fresh fruit.

You also might want to save this for a delicious homemade way to say 'I love you' on Mother's Day, which is a few weeks away.

Storm Debris Removal Continues

Crews Moving into Osage County, Prue Substation Area in April

It may be surprising that we are still making repairs four months after the December ice storm, but we are. The destruction was so widespread, many of our repairs had to be temporary. We have been working to remove those temporary repairs and replace them with more permanent fixtures.

"Recently, we have been picking up damaged material in the Collinsville and Owasso areas," says Randy Riddle, manager of operations and technical services, "But we are now moving into Osage County, and the area served by the Prue substation."

Riddle says VVEC crews are replacing utility poles, hardware and equipment at the top of the poles, and other equipment, such as transformers, that were damaged by the ice.

He says he and VVEC Rightof-Way Coordinator Lon Lambert have been working with FEMA field representatives visiting sites across the service territory to document the storm damage and brush and debris clean-up efforts.

"There is still a lot of debris such as tree limbs, that need to be picked up. We can't clean up anything other than those tree limbs and branches we had to cut to restore service. County clean up crews are working just like our crews to clean up county right-of-way, so members with debris on their property still have an opportunity to have that debris removed if they can move it to the county right-of-way.

"We're making a pretty concentrated effort to get this cleaned up as soon as possible," Riddle says. "But it is probably going to be sometime this summer before our crews have all the work completed system-wide."

He encourages members to call the co-op if they are aware of a repair that needs to be made. Call our dispatching department at 371-2584, Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
