Few Outages During State's Worst Blizzard

The Blizzard of 2011 is a storm no one is likely to forget very soon. Record amounts of snow, on top of a sheet of ice, made more unbearable by temperatures that fell below the zero mark and remained there.

As harsh as it was, it could have been worse if VVEC members would have been without electricity.

Fortunately, only a few outages occurred. Being able to deliver electricity in that severe weather didn't happen by accident; it was the result of year-round programs aimed at keeping electrical equipment in good working order, and rights-of-way clear and maintained.

VVEC crews work throughout the year checking poles and equipment, while right-of-way crews clear trees, limbs, and brush from near powerlines.

"When we have severe weather, and only a few members have outages, then we know those programs are paying off," says Mike Hall, VVEC director of operations.

If you have trees or branches that need to be removed from our right-of-way, please call the co-op at (918) 371-2584, Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.

What to do if Your Power Goes Off


- 1. Check your fuses or circuit breakers. Every service is different. You may have fuses or circuit breakers in your house, on the side of your house, under your meter, or all three places. Check to see if your neighbors have electricity.
- 2. Call the Co-op at 371-2584, or 1-800-870-5948 if the call is long distance for you. Have your account number, name as it appears on the account, and address handy to give to the dispatcher. If you should get a recording, please don't hang up; leave your information. It will be retrieved and given to the correct department. Every message is answered.

If the snow made it difficult for you to receive or pay your electric

bill, don't forget you have options in addition to the U.S. Mail.

You can view your bill at www.VVEC.com, where you can see the amount of your bill and the date by when payment is due.

If you want to pay your bill online, simply scroll down the homepage to the 'pay your bill online' icon. Click on it and follow the prompts. You can pay using your credit or debit card or your checking account. There is no charge for this service.

Or you can pay over the phone using the Choice Pay feature. There is a \$3.95 charge for this service.

By using these features, you can check your account and pay your bill from the comfort and warmth of your home. 55

E-Mail Meter Readings Instead of Calling or Mailing Them to the Co-op

If you are one of the accounts that has to call or send in your meter readings each month, you can now E-mail those readings to the co-op.

Those accounts have a meter reading grid on the return portion of the monthly bill. If the grid is not on the bill, then you do not need to send in a reading.

Now the readings can be E-mailed to Meterreadings@VVEC.com, and should be sent on or before the 25th of each month.

The E-mail needs to include:

- account number
- meter number
- date the meter was read

These meters need to be read at the same time each month; between the 6th and the 24th of the month.

It's Already Time to Think **About Air Conditioning**

The comfortable spring weather is more likely to nudge you to open your windows than to turn on the air conditioner – and that makes this the perfect time to make sure your a/c is in shape for the summer heat that's just a few months

The best time to service your home's air conditioning system is when you don't need it. If you put if off until it's 90 degrees outdoors, you could be dealing with some down time that can leave your home pretty uncomfortable.

Annual service is important because your technician will lubricate and clean moving parts and check for – and repair – potential problems. That will make it more likely that your system will run smoothly all summer.

Choose an a/c tech who is licensed by the state. Chances are, the same tech can come back in the fall to tune up your heating system.



Upgrade Your Windows and Save

If you live in an older home, it's a good bet that its windows are made from single panes of glass.

Newer homes typically come with double-pane windows, and for good reason: They're far more energy efficient. In fact, the U.S. Department of Energy estimates that you can save between 7 percent and 15 percent on heating and cooling bills when you replace single-pane windows with double-pane versions, especially if they're rated by the government's Energy Star program as extraenergy efficient.

You can find out how much money you can save each year if you replace your old windows with more efficient models. Visit www.energystar.gov/ia/ products/windows doors/CitySavingsEstimates.pdf.

Savings range from \$77 in mild climates to more than \$500 in areas with extreme winters or summers.



RECIPE Chicken Spaghetti

4 boneless chicken breasts, cut into small chunks 16-oz. pkg. thin spaghetti 1 can Cream of Mushroom soup, undiluted 1 can Cream of Chicken soup, undiluted 1/4 cup diced onion 1/4 cup diced celery 1 lb. Velveeta, cubed 1 can Rotel Salt and pepper to taste Grated cheese Sliced black olives

In large saucepan, cook chicken breasts, onion and celery, in boiling water until tender. Remove chicken and strain broth. Cook spaghetti in broth while chicken cools. Once spaghetti is cooked, drain, remove from heat.

Add soups, Velveeta, Rotel, and salt and pepper. Stir until cheese is almost melted, stir in chicken. Pour into greased baking dish and cook 20 to 25 minutes at 350°. Top with grated cheese and black olives, return to oven until cheese melts.
