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## **Improving Your Quality of Life**

Pursuing an improved quality of life is what gave birth to electric cooperatives. You know the story of those people who lived in the nation's rural areas and whose quality of life was improved drastically when President Franklin Roosevelt's Rural Electrification Act funded the creation of electrical distribution systems throughout those rural areas.

But it took more than federal legislation and congressional funding: it took local residents giving of their time and efforts to make life better.

Those area residents held meetings to create individual cooperatives such as VVEC. They worked with representatives of the Rural Electrification Administration (REA) to obtain funding. Neighbors visited neighbors collecting required membership fees. Area men worked together to set utility poles and string electric line. Great effort from a few improved the quality of life for many.

Improving our members' quality of life has been a priority for VVEC since the co-op's creation. Today, as it was in the beginning, we feel our initial obligation to that effort is to provide dependable, affordable electric service. Having some of the lowest rates in Oklahoma is testament to the success of that endeavor.

But as VVEC has grown, we have found numerous other ways to improve quality of life. We helped members learn how to use their new electric service to make residential life easier, and their commercial lives more productive. We taught efficiency so members could realize the most from their energy dollars. We introduced state-of-the-art technology such as ground-source and air-source heat pumps. We developed rebate programs to make equipment, appliances, and the use of modern, efficient technology more affordable.

We have participated in the Youth Tour program since it began in 1964 under President Lyndon Johnson's guidance. Since that time, we have sponsored almost 200 area youth as they have visited the nation's capitol, witnessing our government at work, and understanding what it means to be an American.

As a long-time friend of education, we created the Adopt-A-School program in 1993.

Through this program we partner with our area school systems to provide needed equipment, study aids, playground equipment, books and software. To date, we have contributed over \$77,000 to this program.

Our Rural Fire grant program allows us to assist area fire departments in obtaining equipment and training which helps lower insurance ratings, and in turn, lowers members' insurance premiums. Since it began in 1995 we have given more than \$157,000 in grants.

Both of these programs have served as patterns for similar programs for other electric cooperatives.

But I feel the reason we as an organization are so successful in improving our members' quality of life is because we have employees and trustees who are generous with their time, talents, and efforts such as those very first co-op members were.

Today we have employees who give of themselves without expecting or receiving any monetary compensation. They work with area youth by coaching little league teams, or are involved with church youth groups. We have employees who give of their time to mentor to young people suffering debilitating illnesses. Not all pain and loss is suffered by our human neighbors; we have employees who are sympathetic to our four-legged loved ones, and so they offer their assistance. We have employees who extend the work of their churches by visiting the sick or infirm.

Throughout this annual report you will meet a few of our people who make a difference through their generosity. They are but just a handful of the outstanding people we are fortunate to have working with us at VVEC. I am proud of each of them for choosing to make a difference and to contribute to improving lives and bettering communities.

As an organization, we will continue to focus on programs and services that enhance your lives as we continue to provide reliable, affordable electric service. I have no doubt we will continue to be successful in these endeavors because improving and enhancing others' lives is the quiet, understated mission of our people.

#### **EMPLOYEE OF THE YEAR**

#### **Randy Parsons**

Loyalty and generosity are two of the main reasons VVEC employees honored co-worker Randy Parsons as the cooperative's 2010 Employee of the Year.

Parsons, who began his career with VVEC in 1990, is currently a construction lineman.

"He is our most experienced foreman," says Randy Riddle, manager of operations and technical services. "He supervises a construction crew and has trained, or helped train, many of the young linemen we have working for us today. Randy was voted Employee of the Year because of the knowledge he shares with his co-workers, his patience with the younger ones, and the loyalty he shows toward his crew members."

Although the identity of the recipient is kept secret until the employee Christmas party, Parsons says he was truly surprised to be given this honor.

# Cifloe and Richardson Misty F Robyn Richardson Friend of Education

Being a friend to education is a family affair for Robyn Richardson.

Robyn and her husband John Edd were active, supportive parents when their three children were in school. They were home-room parents, they often prepared treat bags for the kids' classmates and sports teams, along with supplying treats for class holiday celebrations. Robyn even cooked a turkey for one first grade Thanksgiving celebration. Their kids were tutors and mentors to other younger students. Today, their daughter-in-law is a paraprofessional and their grandchildren attend school in Collinsville.

However, the desire to help and remain involved didn't graduate when the Richardson kids did.

Today Robyn and John Edd provide supplies such as notebooks, paper, pencils, and Crayons to Wilson Elementary First Grade teacher Misty Ragle. Robyn keeps an eye out for sales throughout the year and buys everything from disinfectant wipes to supplies to treats, and then gives them to Ms. Ragle for her students. They have boxes of supplies in their garage to share with Ms. Ragle's classes when they are needed.

"We make sure there are additional supplies at the beginning of the (school) year," says Robyn. "But we try to help all year long. There is such a need for these things."

# John Hibdon Trustee

"Beside being a grandparent, this is the most fun I've had," John Hibdon says smiling, when he talks about coaching young boys in the Barnsdall Elementary Wrestling Program.

For the past 32 years, 'Coach John' has taught the fundamentals of wrestling to Barnsdall boys between the ages of 5 and 13. Although the program uses Barnsdall Public Schools facilities and equipment, the program is not school sponsored.

John, who serves as trustee for VVEC's district 4, developed a passion for the sport as he was growing up in Altus. He wrestled in high school and as a student at Claremore Junior College.

But he was simply trying to help out when his efforts resulted in the current program in Barnsdall. Only a few families were wrestling when severe weather one winter prevented them from attending out-of-town practices. At the request of some of those parents, John taught a few practice sessions. The next year parents asked him to coach their sons at home. John ran an ad in the local newspaper to see how many young boys might be interested in learning the sport.

"About 35 to 40 youngsters showed up," he says. "And that number has remained pretty constant for over 30 years now."



John laughs when he says he's now coaching the sons of some of his former students, and evidence of how many boys that is and what accomplished wrestlers many of them became, can be found on the walls of their practice room. Painted on the walls are the names and years his wrestlers won a variety of honors. At one end of the room, beginning just below the ceiling and descending down the wall, is a lengthy list of his students who are State champions; while at the other end are the champions' photos, plaques and trophies. Some have gone on to wrestle for junior colleges and four-year universities such as wrestling powerhouse, Oklahoma State.

While the accolades belong to the young wrestlers, the reward belongs to John. "There is a special kind of reward that comes from working with kids, especially at this age. They are enthusiastic and eager to learn," he says.

"Wrestling in Oklahoma is like a family,

and this has become my second family," he says.

For young boys and their parents in Barnsdall, Coach John is a beloved member of the family.


Jane Van Sickle





Oklahoma Firefighters Burn Camp

For five days each summer Ronn Badertscher works with some very beautiful people. He serves as a counselor at the Oklahoma Firefighters Burn Camp.

Held at Dry Gulch, USA, northeast of Pryor, the camp is aimed at young people who have suffered any type of a variety of debilitating physical injuries. Kids from 5 to 16 years old enjoy arts and crafts, horseback riding, swimming, bumper cars, movies, Karaoke, fishing on Lake Hudson, and a trip to a nearby wild animal sanctuary.

Ronn, VVEC's meter tester and a volunteer fire fighter with the Collinsville Rural Fire Department, has been a burn camp counselor for nine of the camp's 12 years. The camp has one counselor for each camper, and Ronn also works with the junior counselors.

"These people are very inspirational people," he says. "They fight their disabilities everyday. Burn Camp gives them the opportunity to be themselves. Here, no one looks

at them like they're any different; they're just normal kids."

Ronn feels he benefits from the camp too. "Working with these kids makes me count my own blessings."
